An average of 250 children are diagnosed per year with 0% chance of survival. Less than 4% of the government research dollars goes to Pediatric Cancers.

DIPG, or **diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma**, is a type of brain tumor found in an area of the brainstem. The name diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma describes how the tumor grows, where it is found, and what kinds of cells give rise to the tumor.

Students who pay only \$10 (With all proceeds going to pediatric/DIPG cancer research) would get to tie-dye 2 shirts, one for themselves and one for a pediatric cancer patient. We are making arrangements for Indiana 105 to be here that day. We are going to have the Video Productions class video record the event so we can get it on social media and out to the community.

Some universities are no longer demanding an ACT or an SAT assessment for admissions purposes.

Below are dates and deadlines for students who need the ACT or SAT. A current senior who plans on pursuing traditional postsecondary education should take ACT or SAT as soon as possible. Even though his or her college may not require it, having test scores on file could help with scholarships and placement. It is wise to take these assessments while a student is still actively studying English, math, and in some cases, science.

## From the Desk of Mrs. Ellis


October is Anti-Bullying month.

- Bullying affects all youth, including those who are bullied, those
  who bully others, and those who witness bullying. The <u>effects of</u>
  <u>bullying</u> may continue into adulthood.
- There is not a single profile of a young person involved in bullying.
   Youth who bully can be either well connected socially or marginalized, and may be bullied by others as well. Similarly, those who are bullied sometimes bully others.
- Solutions to bullying are not simple. <u>Bullying prevention</u> approaches
  that show the most promise confront the problem from many
  angles. They involve the entire school community—students, families, administrators, teachers,
  and staff such as bus drivers, nurses, cafeteria and front office staff—in creating a culture of
  respect. Zero tolerance and expulsion are not effective approaches.
- Bystanders, or those who see bullying, can make a huge difference when they intervene on behalf of someone being bullied.
- Studies also have shown that adults can help prevent bullying by talking to children about bullying, encouraging them to do what they love, modeling kindness and respect, and seeking help.
